Tech startup gets govt boost

A technology startup, cofounded by previous 40under40 award winner Tim Brewer, has received a \$598,000 commercialisation grant from the federal government.

A technology startup, cofounded by previous 40under40 award winner <u>Tim Brewer</u>, has received a \$598,000 commercialisation grant from the federal government.

<u>Functionly</u>, established in Western Australia in 2018, is an organisational resourcing software designed for workplaces to plan and manage tasks and responsibilities in real-time.

It was co-founded by chief executive Mr Brewer, who received a Business News 40under 40 award in 2012, and fellow Western Australian Damian Bramanis, now based in the UK.

Functionly has 18 full and part-time employees globally, including a team of eight in Perth.

The federal government's Accelerating Commercialisation (AC) grant takes the company's pre-seed funding round to \$1.4 million, following angel investment in late 2018.

The grant will be used to accelerate work on the resourcing software, including completing its development in preparation for customer trials and research with <u>Curtin University</u>, and bring the product to full commercialisation.

<u>Functionly</u> said it had seen a dramatic increase in the need for organisations to make changes to strategy and resourcing throughout the COVID-19 pandemic.

"The grant will enable us to continue our momentum, despite the current economic situation brought about by COVID, so we can bring a tool to market sooner which we know will be helpful to organisations in these uncertain times," Mr Brewer said.

The Functionly software has already been used in paid trials with Perth-based HealthEngine, led by a
